The Bill gives Scotland the opportunity to lead the way in ending this huge inequality in society; an inequality which companies profit from, whilst many on low incomes suffer. Nobody should have to be out of pocket for reasons they cannot control; reasons which reoccur on a monthly basis, decade after decade. We all need food to survive and we accept this as a necessary personal expense, but it is not a gender discriminant expense. Having a period is. I fully support this Bill to help girls, women and their families keep more money in their pocket.

Please explain the reasons for your response

I would not necessarily support any dispensary system where the recipient has to, in effect, go "cap-in-hand" for sanitary products. I have always felt this adds to the stigma of being hard-up, and must make life very unenjoyable. I can imagine a person's pride must be dented each time they make their way to a food bank or similar service, hoping not to be spotted. I would argue that there must be a better system of dispensing items, and I would suggest that the range of "free" goods be stocked on all retailers shelves next to the sanitary products which are for sale. The recipient would then be able to shop normally, and at the check-out the product would be scanned as normal but with a zero charge appearing. Retailers could order these free sanitary products in advance - paid up front by the Government; or the Government invoiced by the retailers afterwards - and this would benefit retailers, whilst also helping solve the issue raised in the Bill which refers to dispensary centres having to be staffed. In short, this Bill should aim to remove stigma altogether.

This more discreet method would benefit the footfall of all retailers (ie women and girls using their store), and would end the stigma of recipients accepting "hand-outs".
