Please explain the reasons for your response

I would have these free to all. I appreciate the costs and administration involved though. At the least I would like to see them free for all girls in school and universities. A system of entitlement for those on low incomes would be attractive too, but via some system that does not stigmatise women and their daughters as 'poor'. For myself, I am content to continue to pay, though greater access to (the ability to purchase or free) sanitary products throughout the workplace and in public buildings would be enormously helpful.

Please explain the reasons for your response

a) I would expect the provision of free sanitary products to have some cost to the state b) I expect free sanitary provision would have some cost to colleges, schools etc - in conjunction with the state c) I expect manufacturers and suppliers of sanitary products will benefit. And this is where I am most sceptical. Currently sanitary products are price competitive and supermarket's own brands, for example, are very good value. My concern is that if they are purchased by tax money, or by colleges etc, the manufacturers and suppliers will raise their prices to whatever the larger purchaser will pay. I would be keen to see some engagement with this issue to attempt to ensure this profiteering does not happen. However, I expect that it will and what we will see is basic and not-very-efficient products provided at inflated costs to the state or colleges and then distributed by them as free, and premium, efficient products available to purchase, I expect also at an inflated cost. The suppliers of sanitary products will say they have raised prices to recoup costs, but I suspect they will benefit across the range - free to premium - and will in fact be beneficiaries of this. However, I am accepting of this if it affords removal of stress and humiliation and greater participation in school and work amongst women. So I think it should be cost-neutral for businesses, but I expect they will exploit the change and in fact benefit. d) As noted above, I expect sanitary providers will raise prices for those still paying and claim they have to. I do not believe this is true, but ultimately I believe women who are not entitled to free sanitary products will pay for those who are. They will pay through both tax and through supplement to prices. I am frustrated by the cynicism and exploitation implied, but I remain fully supportive anyway, as I am supportive of the affordance of dignity and participation amongst women even if it ends up costing me.

Please explain the reasons for your response

Research has demonstrated that period stress comprises a barrier to social, education and work participation amongst women, and women on low incomes in particular. By removing this barrier, there should be no period-based reason for lack of participation, and for all women, the removal of stress about access to sanitary products and 'accidents' will improve the quality of that participation. This is simply a removal of a barrier to full participation in social and economic life and as such will have an equalising effect.

Q11. In what ways could any negative impact of the proposed Bill on equality be minimised or avoided?

there are 2 potential areas of concern in my opinion.

1. Stigmatisation of women as 'poor'. This is a sensitive issue and needs carefully thought out, particularly for the most vulnerable groups, such as girls in schools.
2. While I have no objection to manufacturers of sanitary products to do well, I would hate to see poor quality products sold at inflated prices to public and educational organisations.
